The Consolation of Philosophy is perhaps unique in the nature and extent of its influence on Western thinking. An eminent public figure under the Gothic emperor Theodoric, Boethius (c. A D 475-525) was also an exceptional Greek scholar and it was to the Greek philosophers that he turned when he fell from favour and was imprisoned in Pavia.

The Consolation of Philosophy is a short work of literature, written in the form of a prosimetrical apocalyptic dialogue (i.e. a dialogue with a mythical, imaginary, or allegorical figure). It contains five Books, which are written in a combination of prose and verse.

The Consolation of Philosophy

Boethius wrote a consolation of Philosophy, not Theology, and we could assume that at least part of his motivation was coldly stylistic rather than personally applicable. Boethius carefully imitated the Platonic dialogues, and to have the Christian God intrude into what was a pagan form would have offended his sensibilities.

Boethius's best known work is the Consolation of Philosophy (De consolatiōne philosophiæ), which he wrote most likely while in exile under house arrest or in prison while awaiting his execution. Boethius's most popular and enduring work, though, was the "Consolation of Philosophy", which he wrote in prison in 523 while awaiting his execution.
